SYLLABUS

On July 30, 1976, the Judicial Inquiry Board filed a multi-paragraph complaint with the Courts Commission, charging the respondent with willful misconduct in office, conduct that is prejudicial to the administration of justice and conduct that brings the judicial office into disrepute. In summary form, the allegations as amplified in a bill of particulars were that the respondent violated Supreme Court Rule 61(c)(18) (Ill. Rev. Stat. 1975, ch. 110A, par. 61(c)(18)), in that he improperly denied bail to a defendant; that he ordered male defendants convicted of various traffic offenses to obtain haircuts as a condition of probation; that he ordered defendants convicted of illegal transportation of alcohol to pick up discarded bottles and cans along the highways as a condition of probation; and that he ordered defendants convicted of misdemeanor and traffic offenses to surrender their driver's license to the court as a condition of probation and, in lieu of the license, he caused to be issued to said defendants a certificate which contained language to the effect that the bearer of the certificate had posted his valid driver's license with the court during the period of his probation.

Held: Order of the Courts Commission expunged pursuant to order of the Supreme Court.
